CHAIR'S REPORT

Ten years! What a journey! When Nevil and I established this little experiment back in 2015, it was *simply that*. Part of a bigger project, just to see how it went. In that first year, on a budget of \$200, relying almost entirely on family and friends and with almost no promotion, the first festival attracted over 500 visitors – enough to convince us that we were onto something and that it was worth another go. We could never have imagined ten years ago that we still would be here.

In 2024 we have finished on a high, with a full carpark, a beautiful day, a paddock full of stalls, excellent speakers, great music and our best crowd ever (well over our target of 2000). We finished as we had hoped, with people wanting more and sad to see us go.

The festival has had its challenges over the years. We have battled volunteer shortages, wild weather and disastrous seasons, but our greatest challenge was arguably Covid. It was only due to the tenacious efforts of our ever-resourceful and ever-patient Coordinator, Allan, that we were able to negotiate the Covid nightmare and never missed an event.

But the challenges, however big, have always been outshone by the positives. Right from the start our festivals have been blessed with some wonderful guest speakers, excellent musicians and world-class chefs. Festival visitors have always been treated to a wide range of educational and entertaining family activities, all in a unique setting that cannot be duplicated.

At this point I want to acknowledge three locals- our nearest neighbours - who saw the value in this festival for their community and have been here since the start, in one form or another: Michael Heazlewood, Christopher Walkden and Jenny Eddington.

In our very earliest days, Christopher recommended we contact a man called John, who had been MC for an event he'd been involved in. We did contact him and John Harris has remained a part of the TGTF family ever since. Every year, without fail, he has turned up and carried us all through the day's programme with his own unique style. John, you have always been one of our biggest champions. You have always seen the value in this event and your enthusiasm has always shone through. So much so that it was John who led us to our Coordinator of the last five years, Allan Roark.

Allan, I hope you know how much we have all appreciated your calm and steady leadership, sometimes in the face of seemingly insurmountable odds. You have been the rock we needed and it's a good thing we've called it a day because I dread to think how we would have filled your shoes. Thank you, Allan, for all you have done (except your jokes).

I cannot overstate my gratitude to the committee and managers who have kept the festival running like the smooth, well-oiled machine that it has become. The wide range of skills, knowledge and qualifications that you have all brought with you over the years has ensured that each year the event has grown in strength and impact. It bears repeating the comments I made in this same space last year about the TGTF committee and management:

What is it about this committee that I love? It's our like-mindedness. We are all here for the same reason; because we all believe in our community, in the right to good health and good local food, in the importance of education and awareness-raising and in being able to celebrate and share what we have with others. It's the friendship and camaraderie that exists within this team. It's the relaxed, friendly, approachable nature of every single committee member. It's the imagination, innovation, ideas and experimentation that brings freshness and vibrancy to every new year. It's the willingness to go above and beyond to fill a gap, to seek solutions and to step in to ease someone else's load. It's the forgiving nature of each committee member when one of us at any one time doesn't quite get it right. It's the knowledge that every single one of us, no matter how busy or caught up we are in our own lives, is always doing the best we can. And it's the way that we can all sit down at the end of a busy working bee, during festival set-up or after the event and share a meal, a joke and a problem. No one can ask more than that. So to all committee members, thank you.

I want to make special mention this year to Bec Rumble, who stepped relatively late into the demanding role of Stallholder Manager. The transition was smooth and seamless and the results on festival day were testament to her skillfulness.

Every year, wonderfully enthusiastic volunteers have rolled up and pitched in to help. I believe that 2024, due in large part to our Volunteer Manager, Mark, was our best year yet for volunteers. To our amazing volunteers, we literally could not do it without you. It seems you are part of a dwindling breed, but you are the very stuff that helps communities stay alive and thrive.

Thank you to the three Scout Groups who supported us in your various roles – Westbury Venturer Scouts, Tamar Sea Scouts and Hellyer Scouts. To the workers from Deloraine House, thank you for your work in the Children's Area. And to the team from Northern Tasmanian Cavy Club, for your help on this year's gate.

To Phil Brumby and team – thank you yet again for standing by throughout every festival to deal with anything from the smallest scratch to the biggest medical crisis. We cannot operate without services like yours, so thank you.

Finally, a huge thank you to my family. To Nevil, for going along with the daft idea of a festival in the first place and sharing this rollercoaster ride all the way. To our children for willingly sharing your family childhood home with a bunch of strangers and for pitching in to help out in any way you could. Thank you to my siblings and extended family for being the world's best volunteers – pitching in and helping out, whenever asked, however you could. Special thanks to Graeme for year upon year of testing and tagging, to Michael for managing the parking, Mark for directing traffic and Debra for first aid and anything else that was asked of you.

So here we are, having declared the Tasmanian Garlic & Tomato Festival as we know it, officially ended. With no plans for a 2025 event in the offing (although talks are in progress) and most of our committee moving on, the Organisation is set to elect a skeleton committee to navigate the next stage – whatever that may be. This is an oddly bitter-sweet moment. Together, we have built the festival to be better and better each year. Together, as a team, we have worked well, always with good humour, kindness and generosity towards each other. We are not winding up, like so many other festivals, because of exorbitant insurance fees, lack of money or volunteers. We are bringing this event to a close simply because those who started it are exhausted and cannot continue to deal with the stress of maintaining such a high standard for another year.

And the saddest thing for me? It's when my grandchildren say, "Nanna, *please* can we have another festival? *PLEASE*?" My grandchildren have absolutely loved having their farm over-run with visitors (and have been the only children to ever find themselves in the Lost Children's Tent – not because they *were* lost but because they were so much at home that others *thought* they were lost), but given their young ages, even the eldest will scarcely remember the wonderful festivals that happened at Nanna and Grandpop's.

To all of you who have contributed to "Tassie's Best Little Festival", thank you. You have helped bring joy to thousands of people as you have worked over the last ten years to bring this festival to life. It is due to your efforts that the TGTF has injected millions of dollars back into the community and contributed many thousands of dollars to other community organisations. Together, we have created a class act of which we can be justly proud.

Our carparking crew led by Michael Brown kept traffic flowing effortlessly. Phil Brumby made life easy on the first aid front, dispensing band aids with a smile and his own brand of inimitable good humour. Our commercial cleaners Anna and her crew who made sure the Portaloos were clean and comfortable, which are an important yet often overlooked component of any event. John Harris has been the MC throughout and has as always delivered for the festival in what is a difficult position but as ever the professional made it seem easy.

Mark Bennic's volunteers have been amazing again this year and Mary Gill's bin crew made it effortless to ensure recycling, food waste etc. all went into the right bins.

This year's chefs Bjoern Schorrp and Analiese Gregory's food items were sublime and the comedy duo of Bec's

GATE & TICKETING REPORT

This year's volunteers at the gate were members from the Northern Tasmanian Cavy Club. Eight members manned the gate, two lines were formed, one for prepaid tickets and one for cash/card sales. Good signage ensured that most people ended up in the right place and the lines moved at a good pace. Most of the early arrivals had prepaid tickets.

The ticketing system worked very well with members scanning the prepaid tickets from their phones via the Trybooking app. It became a bit of a competition between members to see who had scanned the most people in. Eight was a good number to get the patrons into the grounds for the early morning rush and then be able to give each other breaks when things slowed down around lunch time.

Many thanks to the NTCC members for their support and positive attitude which made the gate work a fun place to be.

STALLHOLDERS REPORT

We had 45 stall holders occupying 55 stands. We had 8 stall cancellations (11 sites) in the two weeks leading up to the festival, including one on the morning of the festivaland one no show.

These cancellations meant there were some 'gaps' in the stall holder paddock but it didn't feel empty - it just created a better corridor to get to the Tomato Patch tours and Bushwalk.

We had 12 food stalls (inc two coffee vans). The queues for food were quite long, so it would have beneficial to have the extra stalls, however customers seemed to be enjoying what we had on offer.

This year all food stalls accepted volunteer food vouchers. - 74 food vouchers were issued - 63 were redeemed. This was a very practical way we could say thank you to our volunteers.

We also positioned all the alcohol vendors facing the food area -meaning we had a food and drinks area of the festival.

Speaking with the stall holders on the day - they felt it was a fantastic festival. Many sold out of product some saying it was the most financially viable event they'd attended in the last year. I did send an email on the Friday before the festival advising the festival was looking to be a sell out and advising them to bring enough stock, saying "if you don't have it you can't sell it" - a number of vendors parroted this back to me on the day.

In relation to bump in, on the Saturday I did not require a helper. On the Sunday morning I had someone at the entrance to the paddock pointing people in my direction. I also had Christopher in the Food area helping set vendors up with power. I handed out the welcome sheets, liquor licenses and food voucher information once stalls were set up and calm.

Bump out was speedy with all vendors off site before 5pm.

SPEAKERS & PRESENTERS REPORT

Our festival theme this year was *What's Growing in Your Backyard?* This question provided a perfect springboard for all of our guest speakers to focus their presentations. It was an honour for me to be able to open our final festival with an opportunity to reflect upon and thank our many backyard-grown committee and volunteers across the last ten years. Equally, the ever-popular tomato tours provided an opportunity to show visitors exactly what is growing in the backyard of the farm on which this festival is situated. In the Speaker's Tent, we were very pleased to welcome back two highly popular and exceptional presenters in Penny Woodward and Tim Reed. Penny is an author of several books, notably including publications on garlic and tomatoes. She is an experienced organic gardener and former horticultural editor of ABC's Organic Gardener Magazine.

Tim was 2021 Landcare Farmer of the Year and is Vice President of Soil First Tasmania and on the management team of Tamar NRM. He has a deep understanding of the importance of healthy soil as the foundation for growing good food, both in the paddock and in the back yard.

Dr Elizabeth Haworth is a specialist in infectious and environmental diseases. A farmer and gardener herself, she was able to give some very practical advice on how to look after ourselves in our own backyards.

WASTE MANAGEMENT REPORT

This year we continued our Waste management system started in 2023. Stall holders were asked to provide a list of what waste items their stall so we had an idea of what we would need to manage and to pay a small fee if they did not take all their own waste home with them. Two stall holders paid to leave their waste with us and we provided bins for them to do so.

We provided wheelie bins to collect landfill waste, recyclables and a smaller bin for food and organic waste. Bins were set up in 3 Hubs, with a set of each bin type at each hub. Again, the 1st Tamar Venturer Unit were our wonderful "Bin fairies", standing in pairs at each bin and helping festival patrons dispose of their waste correctly. This worked very well with no contamination of waste and a great camaraderie between the Venturers and patrons. The Venturer unit were even approached by organisers of another festival to provide the same service for them.

Compostable packaging is still unable to be sent to FOGO which meant all of this went to landfill. At the end of festival, we had one wheelie bin full of cans (240l bin); 1 bin of cardboard; 16 bins of landfill waste; half a bin of plastic bottles and a small quantity of glass bottles. We had 6 bins (partially full) of food & organic waste for composting (70l bins).

Again, it was a pleasure to work with the committee and 1st Tamar Venturer unit in managing the waste in such a pro-active way.
